She was the wife of <u>Gruffudd ap Cynan</u>, was a daughter of <u>Owain ab Edwin</u>, a chieftain of eastern Gwynedd. She married <u>Gruffudd</u> about 1095, during his early struggle for power, and survived her husband many years, dying in 1162. Their children were Cadwallon (died 1132), <u>Owain (Gwynedd)</u>, and <u>Cadwaladr</u>, and five daughters, named <u>Gwenllian</u>, Marared (Margaret), Rainillt, Susanna, and Annest. Of these, <u>Gwenllian</u> married <u>Gruffydd ap Rhys</u>, and Susanna married <u>Madog ap Maredudd</u>.

Angharad is singled out for lavish praise by her husband's biographer, as a handsome blonde, gentle, eloquent, generous, discreet, good to her people and charitable to the poor. <u>Gruffydd</u> left her, in addition to the half of his goods as provided by Welsh law, two shares of land (*rhandir*) and the profits of the port of Abermenai.
