The History of Gruffydd ap Cynan relates how Cynwrig came to Chester, where <u>Gruffydd</u> had been a prisoner of earl Hugh for twelve years, how he saw the prince lying in chains, bore him away while the burgesses were having a meal, sheltered him secretly under his roof, and then took him to Anglesey. If the story is true, it was an event of great consequence to Welsh history in view of the subsequent careers of <u>Gruffydd</u> and his descendants. Arthur Jones (editor of the *History*) and <u>Sir J. E. Lloyd</u> do not agree on the length of <u>Gruffydd</u>'s imprisonment, nor, as a result, on the date of Cynwrig's visit to Chester, and <u>Lloyd</u> did not place 'absolute confidence' in the story. The *History* is, nevertheless, an early authority.
