Born 1808, son of ' Dafydd the Weaver and Betty ' of Tanrallt, Cribin, Cardiganshire. He went to school at Cribin and Ystrad under T. J. Griffiths (Tau Gimel, 1797? - 1871) and Rees Davies of Ystrad. His ambition was to enter the Unitarian ministry, and in 1825 he was admitted to Carmarthen College; unfortunately, his health broke down and he was only there for a short time. He became a schoolmaster at Cribin and, during the later years of his life, at Cilmaenllwyd, Carmarthenshire; he translated into Welsh the works of many Greek and Latin authors, particularly those of Ovid. An original manuscript of his works was in the possession of <u>Rees Jenkin Jones</u> of Aberdare, and the Rev. D. Evans of Cribin had a copy. He wrote over fifty hymns, and <u>Daniel Evans (Daniel Ddu</u>, 1792 - 1846) thought highly of him as a hymn-writer. Apart from the hymns he left behind him an uncompleted poem, ' Dydd Barn,' some songs, several *englynion*, and a memorial *awd/* to <u>D. L. Jones</u>, tutor at Carmarthen. He died 8 January 1833 at the age of 25 and lies in Dihewyd churchyard.
