son of Edwin ab Einion and great-grandson of <u>Hywel Dda</u>. When, in 1033, the usurper, Rhydderch ap lestyn died, Hywel and his brother Maredudd, as senior heirs of <u>Hywel Dda</u>, became joint kings of Deheubarth. Maredudd's death in 1035 left Hywel sole ruler, and on him fell the brunt of defending the south against the Vikings and the northern usurper, <u>Gruffudd</u> ap Llywelyn. Expelled by <u>Gruffudd</u> in 1042 or 1043, he returned in 1044, with the Danes as allies, and was killed in battle at the mouth of the Towy.
