Nothing is known of his private life. He wrote an exceptionally neat hand, and he had opportunities to copy some of the older Welsh manuscripts, e.g. the 'Black Book of Carmarthen' and the 'White Book of Rhydderch,' possibly through friendships with Jasper Griffith. His interests were wide and there remain of his transcription collections of lives of saints (Llanstephan MS 34), a botanology (N.L.W. 4581), heraldic, genealogical, and historical texts in Welsh and English (Mostyn 113, Pen. 168), poetry (Llanstephan MS 9), N.L.W. 1553), the Mabinogion and romances (Mostyn 135), grammars (Pen. 169), and anecdotes and miscellanea (Llanwrin 1). It is obvious from references by other copyists that all his work has not survived. A notable feature of his writing is that he adopted the orthography of Dr. Gruffydd Robert, and under-dotted letters instead of doubling them. A number of his manuscripts had come into the possession of Thomas Evans, Hendreforfudd, by 1607.
