Some of his *englynion* and *cywyddau* are preserved in manuscript, among them an elegy to his son (Llanstephan MS 54 🗹 (259)), and a *cywydd* ymryson with Thomas Prys in Jes. Coll. MS. 12 (319), and Mostyn MS. 144 (84), and, in the same manuscripts, two *cywyddau* in reply to him by Thomas Prys and a satirical *cywydd* to him by Huw Machno. In Llanstephan MS 49 🗹 (61) and B.M. Add. MS. 14966 (576) there is a *cywydd* to reconcile him and Siôn Phylip by Edmund Prys. The remainder of his work is found in the following manuscripts: N.L.W. MSS. 253 (284), 644 (89), 836 (38), 1553 (416, 435, 450, 525), 1578 (402), 5545 (187); Mostyn MS. 148 (711); Cwrtmawr MS. 22 (228); Cardiff MSS. 19 (459), 23 (240, 410), 84 (1083); B.M. Add. MSS. 14,874 (178), 14,894 (105). According to J. E. Griffith, *Pedigrees*, 189, where his pedigree is given, he died 23 February 1607, at Chester, and was buried there in S. Mary's church.
