He was a native of Cwmtillery, Monmouth, and one of the converts made by <u>Howel Harris</u> on his first preaching visit to Monmouthshire in March-April 1738. A churchman of good family and well-to-do, he was educated and devout, and under <u>Harris</u>'s influence became a 'much respected exhorter among the Methodists.' He and <u>Morgan John Lewis</u>, his friend and fellow-convert, published a collection of Welsh hymns printed by S. Mason of Pontypool in 1741, and another collection of his hymns was published posthumously in 1742 by Felix Farley, of Bristol. According to <u>Edmund Jones</u> he also published 'something against dancing.' He died in April, and was buried 17 April 1742.
