the sixth and youngest son of Captain John Lewes (below), Gernos, in the parish of Llangunllo ('Llanvayer ' according to Foster, *Alumni Oxonienses*), Cardiganshire. He entered Jesus College, Oxford, 22 February 1683/4, aged 20, graduating in 1688. He became vicar of Roch, Pembrokeshire, 16 June 1692, and vicar of Brawdy, Pembrokeshire, 5 March 1694. In 1695 he became rector of Betws Bledrws and vicar of Lampeter, Cardiganshire. <u>S. R. Meyrick (*The History and Antiquities of the County of Cardigan*) quotes the inscription on his memorial tablet in Lampeter church; he is said to have died 19 February 1744/5 aged 82. English sermons in his handwriting are in NLW MS. 510, some of them written in 1693; NLW MS. 744 contains general notes written by him in English and in Latin.</u>

His father, JOHN LEWES, deserves to be remembered since it was 'at the request of the Reverend Captain Lewes of Gernos ' that <u>Moses Williams</u> undertook the task of translating Vickers's *Companion to the Altar into Welsh*. It was published in London in 1715 under the title *Cydymmaith i'r Allor, Yn dangos, Anian ac Angenrheidrwydd Ymbaratoad Sacrafennaidd, Modd y derbynniom y Cymmun Bendigedig yn Deilwng*.
